Please do not copy front and back. Note that each Report Sheet asks for different information. We will use these sheets to help with class discussions, papers, and presentations. Again, type out the information required for each sheet. Please be warned: any content that resembles that from *Cliffs Notes*, *Spark Notes*, or other “study aid” will receive a -0-. **Each student should do his/her own work and not collaborate with other students.**

Make sure you print and complete all the required sheets:
Just Mercy (2 sheets) Autobiography choice (2 sheets), and *The Anthropocene Reviewed* (3 sheets).

Annotation Expectations

Before you read:

First things first. Do not be afraid to mark up the text. Get those pens, pencils, and highlighters on the page.

While you read:

*Note: You should use a combination of all of the following annotating techniques. You should NOT rely on one strategy (ex. only highlighting the text).

1. Circle any words you don't know, look them up (dictionary apps are great for this), and jot in a short definition in the margin or on a separate sheet of paper.
2. Underline/highlight anything that you believe could be of importance such as revealing insight into characters, descriptions of setting, major plot points, etc.
3. Annotate (make notes) next to your underlining—why is that part important? What are your thoughts? What is the “take away”? There should never be underlining or highlighting without some sort of note by it. Use your margins!
4. “Argue” with the text—if you take issue or disagree with something that's taking place, write a critical comment in the margin that explains why.
5. Write in any **questions** you have next to things you don't understand. Place a ? or Q next to these places so that they are easy to spot.
6. Write in any **opinions** you have about characters, plot points, etc. as you read.

After you read:

Go to the last page of each chapter, and write in one question that you are left with upon finishing your reading of that chapter.
